THIRD SUNDAY IN THE GREAT LENT: VENERATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

AGAPIOS THE MARTYR; ARISTOVOULOS THE APOSTLE

EPISTLE READING OF THE DAY: This morning's Epistle Reading is from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Hebrews, chapter 4, verses 14-16; chapter 5, verses 1-6. It is found in our books, pages 142-143.

Οὐ γὰρ ἔχομεν ἀρχιερέα μὴ δυνάμενον συμπαθῆσαι ταῖς ἀσθενείαις ἡμῶν, πεπειραμένον δὲ κατὰ πάντα καθ' ὁμοιότητα, χωρὶς ἀμαρτίας. Προσερχώμεθα οὖν μετὰ παρρησίας τῷ θρόνῳ τῆς χάριτος, ἵνα λάβωμεν ἔλεον, καὶ χάριν εὕρωμεν εἰς εὕκαιρον βοήθειαν. Πᾶς γὰρ ἀρχιερεύς, ἐξ ἀνθρώπων λαμβανόμενος, ὑπὲρ ἀνθρώπων καθίσταται τὰ πρὸς τὸν θεόν, ἵνα προσφέρη δῶρά τε καὶ θυσίας ὑπὲρ άμαρτιῶν· μετριοπαθεῖν δυνάμενος τοῖς ἀγνοοῦσιν καὶ πλανωμένοις, ἐπεὶ καὶ αὐτὸς περίκειται ἀσθένειαν· καὶ διὰ ταύτην ὀφείλει, καθὼς περὶ τοῦ λαοῦ, οὕτως καὶ περὶ ἑαυτοῦ, προσφέρειν ὑπὲρ άμαρτιῶν. Καὶ οὐχ ἑαυτῷ τις λαμβάνει τὴν τιμήν, ἀλλὰ καλούμενος ὑπὸ τοῦ θεοῦ, καθάπερ καὶ Ἀρφών. Οὕτως καὶ ὁ Χριστὸς οὐχ ἑαυτὸν ἐδόξασεν γενηθῆναι ἀρχιερέα, ἀλλ' ὁ λαλήσας πρὸς αὐτόν, Υίός μου εἶ σύ, ἐγὼ σήμερον γεγέννηκά σε. Καθὼς καὶ ἐν ἑτέρφ λέγει, Σὺ ἱερεὺς εἰς τὸν αἰῶνα κατὰ τὴν τάξιν Μελχισεδέκ.

GOSPEL READING OF THE DAY: This morning's Gospel Reading is from the Holy Gospel according Mark, chapter 8, verses 34-39, chapter 9, verse 1. It is found in our books on pages 293-295.

Today's Apolytikion (Dismissal Hymn) is that of Tone Seven (Grave):

O Lord, by your sacred Cross You abolished death and granted to the thief blessed paradise. The myrrh bearers ceased lamenting and turned to joy. The Apostles did preach the Good News at your command—that You had risen from the dead, O Christ our God, bestowing your mercy on the world evermore.

Introduction to Orthodoxy (Sundays, 9.a.m., upstairs). This class is especially intended for those who are thinking about converting to Orthodoxy and for family members and friends who would like to support them on their journey, but it is also open to people who are already Orthodox and who would like to deepen their understanding of their faith. We explore Christian theology and practice through reading selections of Scripture, the Church Fathers, the lives of the Saints, and other texts representative of the Orthodox worldview. These readings are the starting point for our discussions, which aim at clarifying doctrine and worship and helping us to discover (or rediscover), week after week, why we belong in the Church. THE LORD'S PRAYER IN SPANISH: Padre nuestro, que estás en los cielos, santificado sea tu nombre, venga tu Reino, hágase tu voluntad en la tierra como en el cielo; danos hoy nuestro pan de cada día; perdona nuestras deudas así como nosotros perdonamos a nuestros deudores; no nos dejes caer en la tentación, y líbranos del Mal.

SUNDAY OF THE VENERATION OF THE HOLY CROSS: As we are now midway through the Great Lent, the Church places the Cross before us, both for veneration and for contemplation. The Cross is as much the Symbol of our salvation (for our Lord was crucified on it), as it is a Signpost (it points the way forward). As the Lord says in today's Gospel reading from St. Mark, "If anyone wishes to come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Mark 8:34). In other words, self-negation and obedience enable our way forward. At the conclusion of the Liturgy, a brief service will take place: we process around the church with tray of flowers (representing life); on the flowers is a cross (representing the Source of life). People take a flower home with them and place it among their icons.

TODAY'S ST. JOHN CHRYSOSTOM ORATORICAL FESTIVAL: In lieu of a sermon, the "word" will come to us through the mouths of our Sunday School children, who will be participating in the St. John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival. The younger children are not competing, as the older children are. Nevertheless, they will share their faith with the same fervor. We commend all our participants for their willingness, faith and enthusiasm, and wish them well in the district festival, which will take place at the Church of the Holy Cross, Belmont on April 19, as well as at the Metropolis Festival on May 9. Hopefully, one will make it to the National finals, to take place in Pasadena, CA on June 6.

LOOKING AHEAD, MARCH 25th PROGRAM BY THE GREEK SCHOOL: This will take place in the chapel next Sunday, March 22, at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy. Meanwhile, today, a brief program will take place in the community center during coffee hour. The program will highlight American heroes who took part in the Greek War for Independence in 1821.

Including the most recent gift of \$55,000. to the Capital Campaign by our Ladies Philoptochos, we surpassed \$1 million and are working on our second million! (That's over \$1 million given and pledged since the October 17, 2013 issuance of our building permit—25 years to the day of Loma Prieta.) We keep moving ahead: the Campaign continues until we have completed the building and paid it off.

Meanwhile, the shoring of the deck will be completed this week to accommodate the crane that will start erecting the vertical, or red-iron, steel. The steel work will begin next Monday, March 23 and will last 6 weeks. Following next Sunday's Liturgy (weather permitting), we will go up to the outdoor space on the second floor, over the gallery, where we will view the project site. (For safety reasons, we cannot yet go out onto the site, as it's still a construction site.) Ken Katen and/or Father Stephen will point out some of the salient features.

Looking ahead, we want to get the parking structure up and running; that's our first priority. We expect we will be using the parking component this time next year, when the exterior of the Cathedral will be complete. Work will then begin on the interior. Through your prayers, your vision, and your giving, this Cathedral church will be built and dedicated to the glory of God.

In the Book of Exodus (25:8) God says: "Build me a Sanctuary, and I will appear among you." (Translated from the Septuagint: Καὶ ποιήσεις μοι άγίασμα, καὶ ὀφθήσομαι ἐν ὑμὶν). We've quoted this at least since the start of the Campaign, and we are keeping this "immovable before our eyes," as Deut. 6:8 tells us to, as we rebuild the Cathedral to God's glory, to serve our faithful and all God's people in this blessed dynamic heart of San Francisco.
